I focus on behaviours of national and international importance to understand and intervene to change the beliefs, motivations, and behaviours of individuals, health professionals, and policy makers. I am particularly interested in understanding the multiple effects of motivational, volitional, and automatic processes on health behaviour and the translation of research findings into policy and practice.
